There is a reason for having residential schools for the deaf; that reason is Deaf and Hard of Hearing Students. Everything the administrators and the staff do should somehow be connected with making things better for students and helping students reach their full potential. Just as successful businesses are increasingly customer conscious and service oriented, so should the residential schools be student centered.

Effective residential schools for the Deaf and Hard of Hearing listen well, involve people in meaningful ways, care about learners as individuals and as a total community, and respond quickly and constructively when

Shakespeare lives on at WVSD -- at least in terms of a middle school, for the most frequently asked question in that regard is, "to be or not to be?". In recognition of the developmental needs of middle school aged children the administration and staff of the Elementary School for the Deaf is working closely with the Secondary staff to develop a plan for middle school education. Our plan will include steps for action to include our residential living component as well. The feasibility of an entirely separate facility does not appear to be practical at this time. However, we are committed to doing all we can to ease the transition woes for our middle school aged youth. Included in the dilemma will be the determination of exactly which grades will comprise middle school. In West Virginia 67.4% of our schools include (continued on next page) grades 6-8, while 17.4% include only grades 7 and 8. Addi-tionally, one of our teachers submitted research that recommended ages 10-15 comprise middle school. Considering our diverse student population, that proposal provides a viable alternative. Thus, with many questions and few answers, the overriding question remains, and we press on to resolve the dilemma.

GEAR UP CELEBRATION

The West Virginia School for the Deaf and Blind held its GEAR UP Awards Celebration Thursday, October 17. For the 2002-03 school year 7th, 8th, and 9th graders are involved in GEAR UP. WVSD GEAR UP Coordinator, Mrs. Kathy Kuykendall, welcomed the group to the celebration event. She introduced Hampshire County VISTA. Regina Whetzel, who explained what GEAR UP is and how educational monetary awards were earned. Students who were enrolled in GEAR UP during 2001-02 earned anywhere from \$300-\$500. From The AD's Desk by Mr. Marty Blakely

I have been asked to write a brief history of basketball. Here is my report :

James A. Naismith invented basketball in 1891. He was a P.E. teacher at the International YMCA Training School (now Springfield College) in Springfield, Mass. Luther Gulick, head of the school's P.E. Department, asked Naismith to create a team sport that could be played indoors during the winter.

James formed 13 basic rules for the game and then asked a janitor to nail two boxes to the gym balcony to be used as goals. But the janitor could find only some half-bushel baskets, which James accepted. This new sport became known as bas-

ketball. In December 1891, James' P.E. class played the first basketball game. The class had 18 men, so each team had 9 players. They used a soccer ball, and inspite of much running and shooting, the players scored only one basket in the game. Word of this game

spread quickly, and basketball was soon being played by YMCA groups, high schools, colleges, and semi-professional and professional teams throughout the U.S. and Canada. James published his original 13 rules for the game in the YMCA Training School newspaper on January 15, 1892, but many groups established their own rules and were still playing by them as late as 1915.

Basketball, as played today, is basically the game James invented. But we thank James for this sport, because we are so excited to have our JV and Varsity basketball teams. And, this year we established a middle school coed basketball team.

WVSDB Loom Ready For Weavers

The old loom at the WV Schools for the Deaf and the Blind is now back in service. The loom has been a part of the school since the early 1900's. Mrs. Judy Buckbee, a former teacher at the School for the Blind, used the loom to teach weaving skills during the 1960's. At that time, Mr. Seldon Brannon, a fellow teacher and Hampshire County historian, told Mrs. Buckbee that he had learned to weave on the loom when he was a student at the school.

Although the school has had several looms in its past, this loom, in particular, was known for ease of use and for making a tight weave. When Mrs. Buckbee changed positions at the school, the loom went to the Crippled Children's Shop when it was located on East Main Street. The loom stayed on Main Street until it was returned to the school and placed in storage. When Mrs. Buckbee retired from her position as secretary to the superintendent, she remembered the old loom. She and present superintendent, Mrs. Jane McBride, contacted Nancy Judd, a teacher at the secondary school for the deaf. The three decided the students might enjoy learning how to make rag rugs on the old loom. The loom was located and the pieces were brought to the art room located in the secondary building on campus. Each piece was scrubbed and washed, and the loom was put back together.

Several days were spent in "dressing the loom" or threading it. Mr. Gary Buckbee, Judy's husband, helped by making some badly needed small repairs and replaced hardware that had rusted or no longer existed. Mrs. Buckbee came to school in January and demonstrated beginning weaving techniques to the art students.
